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From the Principal's Desk

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Dear Members of the Hannan Family,

Every educator worth his or her salt will tell you that there is something extraordinary about the beginning of the academic year. Yes, I know. Just a few months ago, we could not wait for the sound of that last bell and the beginning of another perfect, stress-free, binge-watching, beach-going summer break. Six weeks later, having had the opportunity to sleep in on occasion and watched every back-episode of *The Handmaid's Tale*, *Stranger Things*, and *This Is Us*, we begin to feel a strange restlessness. We start thinking about our classes, teams, clubs and events. We long to hear the bell and the pitter-patter of large feet, shuffling their way to academic excellence. We miss the whining, the drama, and the laughter. We miss the kids and the feeling of hope they elicit in each of us.

Regardless of our position at Archbishop Hannan High School – teacher, staff member, or administrator – we are all driven by a call to educate and form young men and women. Hope is the magic elixir that pushes us through the difficult moments that come with high school and growing up. It fuels our passion and reminds us that every new academic year, every month, every day brings new opportunities in the lives of our students, as well as our own.

We are blessed to begin this new school year with plenty of reasons to celebrate. The school year opened with enrollment at capacity with 621 students living the Hawk life. Proceeds from the 2018-19 I Believe campaign provided our returning faculty and staff with an average bonus of \$2,300. Our five-year accreditation visit unequivocally affirmed the caliber of education we provide our students, giving us an overall score of 3.65 out of 4.0 (the national average is 2.75). Four of our Seniors were named National Merit Semifinalists, scoring in the top 1% of all students across the country tested for the PSAT. In addition, four Seniors were named National Merit Scholarship Commended Students, scoring in the top 2% of those students taking the PSAT. Finally, in less than a month, we will complete construction of a new multipurpose room and training facility for our wrestling and cheer programs.

These are all opportunities to remind ourselves of how God continues to bless our school. I certainly can't predict the future, but if this year is in any way like the last nine, it will bring with it moments of challenge, growth, and change as well as more than our share of successes, blessings, and joy. I am very excited to welcome you to the beginning of the 2019-2020 academic year. It's a great new year at Archbishop Hannan High School. This year. Every year.

AdvancED Engagement and Review Report and AdvancED Performance Accreditation

On April 2-3, 2019, a team of four Louisiana educators visited Archbishop Hannan High School to conduct a review of our school in the areas of Leadership Capacity Domain, Learning Capacity Domain, and Resource Capacity Domain. They rated thirty standards under these categories. The findings in the report represented the degree to which these Accreditation Standards were effectively implemented in support of the learning environment and the mission of the school. The rating categories were Needs Improvement, Emerging, Meets Expectations, and Exceeds Expectations. We are pleased to report that we received only one rating of Needs Improvement but only because we just do not have a special education program. We received three ratings of Emerging, seven ratings of Meets Expectations, and nineteen ratings of Exceeds Expectations.

Based on this data, Archbishop Hannan High School received an institution IEQ (Index of Education Quality) of 365.0. The AIN (AdvancED Improvement Network) 5-year IEQ Range is 278.34-283.33. Obviously, we performed well above most other schools and institutions. We are quite proud of our IEQ.

In addition, the Engagement Review Team observed all of our teachers in their classrooms, rating our teachers on 28 items organized in seven environments aligned with the AdvancED Standards. In all seven environments our teacher ratings, 4.0 being the highest, ranged from 2.84 to 3.55. Our teachers showed a strong performance.

We want to thank Dr. Robert Picou and his team for all their time, expertise, and effort on our behalf, as they combed through our documentation and evidence, interviewed our stakeholders, and ultimately wrote their report. Their work has left us some goals and a five-year Action Plan for continuous improvement.

Archbishop Hannan High School was recently informed that four (4) of our seniors were named National Merit Semi-Finalists by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation in association with College Board. The National Merit Scholarship Corporation announced the names of the Semifinalists in the 64th annual National Scholarship Program, and Archbishop Hannan High School is pleased to announce that four students earned the prestigious designation: Ashley Gros, Ben Hundley, Adam McCann, and Katelyn Wilson. Four Scholars represents the largest number in any one year for Archbishop Hannan High School, and this number far exceeds the number for many of the Catholic and private schools in and around New Orleans. They have all earned the title of National Merit Semifinalists for their performance on the PSAT test last fall. These students will go forward to produce a portfolio which will entitle them the status of National Merit Finalists.

Over 1.6 million juniors in about 22,000 high schools entered the 2019 National Merit Scholarship Program by taking the 2017 Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test, which served as an initial screen of program entrants. The nationwide pool of Semifinalists, representing less than one percent of U.S. high school seniors, includes the highest-scoring entrants in each state.

To be considered for a Merit Scholarship award, Semifinalists must fulfill several requirements to advance to the Finalist level of the competition. Over 90 percent of the Semifinalists are expected to attain Finalist standing, and about half of the Finalists will win a National Merit Scholarship, earning the Merit Scholar title. These academically talented high school seniors have an opportunity to continue in the competition for some 7,500 National Merit Scholarships worth more than \$31 million that will be offered next spring.

Student Activities Continued

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Kate Rush went to Catholic High for their annual competition. Matthew took second in the individual Geometry competition, Marie-Claire won third place in the individual Algebra 2 competition, Kate was third in the individual Advanced Math competition. Marie-Claire and Matthew won first place in the team Comprehensive 1.5 competition and third place in the Interschool competition. On January 26th, the team of Katelyn Wilson, Zoe Eymard, Andres Jacob, Matthew Verges, and Marie-Claire Honoree went to Baton Rouge Magnet for their annual competition, where the team of Marie-Claire and Andres earned an honorable mention for the Comprehensive 1.5 competition. On February 16th, the team of Ben Wilson, Katelyn Wilson, Zoe Eymard, Andres Jacob, Marie-Claire Honoree and Matthew Verges attended the first annual Haynes Academy Competition. Matthew won third place in the individual Geometry competition, and the team of Katelyn and Zoe took third place for the Advanced Math team competition. The whole team won third place in the Interschool competition. In addition, we had many members compete in the Rocket City Math Competition, the LSU Math competition, and the LSU Tai-State Math tournament. We had a great year and are looking forward to growing even stronger in the years to come. The Science National Honor Society began a year-long project in August, conducting real world science. They brought the project to closure with a white paper which was delivered to the LA Coastal Protection and Restoration Authority in late April. Below is the abstract from the paper:

Archbishop Hannan High School Science National Honor Society students investigated the presence and conditions of the protective sand berms along the northern shoreline of Lake Pontchartrain. The study focused on collecting evidence to evaluate the assertion that the sand berms were not being replenished at a sustainable rate. Evidence consisted of (1) soil samples both onshore and in water, (2) sand berm cross-sectional areas, (3) comparative satellite imagery of the Lake Pontchartrain northern shoreline, and (4) in situ observations of berm conditions. Our evidence suggests that sand transport, which serves to replenish the protective berm system, is closely tied to shoreline features. Specifically, some westerly stretches of the shoreline are not being replenished at a satisfactory rate. The students argue that this western region of Lake Pontchartrain's shoreline merits inclusion in the next iteration of Coastal Protection and Restoration Authority's Coastal Master Plan.

Science Honor Society students had fun, including two data collection trips on the waters of Lake Pontchartrain, a field trip to LSU's engineering school, and a visit to the LSU Center for River studies which hosts a river model that is 10,000 square feet and based on the topography and bathymetry of the Mississippi River Delta covering southeast Louisiana. They also learned a great deal about the science behind coastal erosion and practical skills such as conducting soil sieving and analysis, sand berm systems, and, of course, the level of effort required to conduct real world science, and then report out findings in a credible way.

The SNHS Leadership team finished the last edit of their Itsagreatday87's whitepaper which was presented to the St. Tammany Levee, Drainage and Conservation District on April 17th.

First AHHS Student To Score a 36 on the ACT

Kate Rush, a sophomore student at Archbishop Hannan High School, recently earned the highest possible composite score of 36 on the ACT. Kate's achievement on the ACT is significant and rare. Marten Roorda, Chief Executive Officer of ACT, states, "Only around two-tenths of 1% of all test takers earn the top score. Among U.S. high school graduates in the class of 2018, just 3,741 of more than 1.9 million students who took the ACT earned a composite score of 36." In fact, earning a composite score of 36 during ones sophomore year is even more exceptional. Perfect scores typically come from older students during junior and senior year. Kate previously took the ACT at the end of her 7th grade year as part of the Duke Talent Identification Program. At just 13, she earned a 30 composite, with perfect scores in English and Reading.

Kate has a very healthy perspective on education. She explains that she "is not satisfied with simply memorizing information or receiving it directly," instead preferring to "derive the subject matter from first principles." Kate adds that she does not place grades as her highest priority and would "much rather focus on understanding and exploring the material." She believes that "viewing school without competition promotes much deeper learning, more intellectual curiosity and exploration, and better relationships among classmates."

Kate's teachers at Archbishop Hannan High School have very high praise for such an outstanding student. Mr. Tim Anger states, "Kate is an extremely talented student. One of her greatest academic strengths is her ability to think critically and ask thought-provoking questions. She is an absolute pleasure to teach in my Advanced Placement United States History class." Ms. Laura Lowe, Archbishop Hannan High School's Mathematics Department Chair, says "Kate truly finds the joy and wonder of discovery through learning. She reminds us how much fun learning can be when we approach new ideas from a place of curiosity. She is a joy to teach." Ms. Rebecca Sigler, Kate's English III Advanced Placement teacher, states, "Kate encapsulates the well-rounded student; not only is she highly intelligent and studious, but she approaches every task with passion, curiosity, and the upmost humility. It is an honor to teach her."

Kate's parents are incredibly proud of the young woman that she is becoming. Kate's mother states, "Kate has always had a curious and creative mind, a strong will, and a generous spirit. We can't wait to see how she uses her talents to make a difference in the world." Kate's father adds, "I am happy that Kate balances her scholarly pursuits with adventurous ones. She has already obtained her advanced open water scuba diving certification, and she is working toward her pilot's license. I wouldn't be surprised to see her lead a Mars mission one day!"

Kate makes a strong effort to remain actively involved in her extracurricular pursuits at Archbishop Hannan High School. She has served as her class president since eighth grade, and she is the current District II President of the Louisiana Association of Student Councils. As a member of the Blackfriars theatre troupe, she portrayed Jack's Mother in the musical Into the Woods, and she will soon appear as Wendy in Hannan's Peter Pan adaptation, Peter/Wendy. Through her involvement with the Science National Honor Society, Kate has participated in hands-on research regarding Louisiana's coastal erosion problem. Additionally, Kate has been a varsity cross country runner since ninth grade, and she is an active member of Mu Alpha Theta, Liturgical Band, and Student Ambassadors.



Kate is deeply involved in activities outside of school as well. As a violin student at Southeastern Louisiana University's Community Music School, Kate was named Outstanding Musician in 2017 and was selected for Louisiana's All-State Orchestra in 2018. Kate is also a Cadet Second Lieutenant in the Civil Air Patrol (CAP), which is the civilian auxiliary of the United States Air Force. She recently received CAP's prestigious Billy Mitchell Award, and she will be attending a CAP Glider Academy in Minnesota this summer, where she will learn to fly an engineless plane.

Kate appreciates that her involvement in a wide variety of activities has allowed her to "form friendships with different types of people and gather knowledge across disciplines." She explains that she "enjoys thinking in ways that stretch the brain" and "loves creating, whether that be by playing violin in an orchestra, sketching in art class, or building a project in engineering."

Kate is currently looking into the possibility of attending the following universities after graduating from Archbishop Hannan High School: Tulane, St. John's College, Rice, Emory, Notre Dame, LSU, the University of Georgia, and Georgia Tech. Kate would like to major in one or more of the following fields: physics, math, philosophy, ecology and evolutionary biology, linguistics, or music.

Kate has long been attracted to a wide range of career choices; she has considered being everything from an astronaut or research scientist to a musician or author. However, Kate says, "Despite my varied career interests (and my refusal to choose one at the moment), I am positive of the fact that, no matter what do, I want to devote my time to improving the lives of those around me and across the world. I want to give of myself in service of others and, in turn, Christ."

One of Cameron’s favorite memories from Archbishop Hannan was getting to be an anchor on the very first episode of Hawk Talk. “It was such a cool moment for myself and for the school in general,” he said. “Hannan allowed me some great opportunities to gain more confidence in my abilities to communicate and talk to large groups effectively. So much of my job (and what will eventually be my career) is pitching ideas. So communication and confidence are really important.”

Following high school, Cameron attended the University of New Orleans and started as an intern on “NCIS: New Orleans” during his senior year of college. “I eventually worked my way from production to the writer’s room in California,” he said. “I interned for a year, then moved to California a week after graduation and started as a Writers P.A.” The following year he became a Script Coordinator for the series and recently co- wrote his first episode set to air on March 5th.

Cameron’s future goals include being staffed fulltime on a television show, eventually becoming a showrunner, and ideally directing one day. “Being able to do something that’s rewarding, both personally and professionally, is a gift.”

Hannan Lady Hawks Capture Softball State Title

The Archbishop Hannan Lady Hawks captured the Division II LA State Championship on April 27 at Frasch Park in Sulphur, LA, securing a dramatic, come-from-behind 6-2 victory over two-time defending state champion Parkview Baptist. After the game, Jim Derry, columnist for nola.com and The Times-Picayune, tweeted, "In 29 years of this job, I can count on one hand more improbable victories considering the situation. Down to their final strike, Hannan softball found a way."

How did they do it? The answer start with the first game of their season, back in mid-February, against John Curtis.

The Lady Hawks were viewed by many to be a program in transition. Five seniors who were major contributors to the 2018 squad that reached the State Semi-finals graduated and were replaced by a talented, if young and unproven, group. To further complicate matters, in a scrimmage in the week prior to the season opener, sophomore 1B Jenna Armstrong injured her shoulder and was lost for the season. The team did return a strong core for 2019, led by senior 1B/OF Sarah Dufour, juniors P Alex Clesi and C Gentry Spinks, sophomore SS Alexis Dale and freshman 2B Kristen Wegener. To this group, head coach Becky Lambert welcomed sophomores 3B Sydney Thompson, OF Shelby Thompson and Rylie Bankston, and freshmen P/DH Amelia Mares, CF Avery Boudreaux, and UTIL Hannan Kennedy.

Against (eventual Division I State Runner-up) John Curtis on that cold and wet February afternoon, the Lady Hawks showed a resiliency that would manifest repeated throughout the season. On two separate occasions, the Hawks battled back from deficits to take the lead. Despite dropping the contest 7-6, the belief -- that the game was never lost until the final out --was born.

In wins against Mount Carmel and Oak Grove (1A State Champions) later that month, Hannan again overcame deficits to lock up impressive victories. The challenging schedule also saw the Hawks best Catholic – Point Coupee (Division IV State Champion) and Holy Savior – Menard (Division III State Runner-up). After securing the district title with a 5-0 record, the Hawks advanced to the Division II State Playoffs with a 22-6 record as the number 2 seed.

After defeating an overmatched Lusher Charter 13-0 to open the playoffs, the Lady Hawks faced their postseason nemesis, St. Charles Catholic, who twice previously sent Hannan home from Sulphur in heart-breaking fashion. The game entered the bottom of the 5th with the two teams tied at 1 and a feeling of déjà vu in the air. With two outs and nobody on, consecutive singles by Spinks, Mares, and Sydney Thompson gave the Hawks a lead they wouldn't relinquish. Alex Clesi was stellar on the mound, striking out 10, and Spinks added a homer in a 6-run 6th inning, en route to a 9-1 victory, and another trip to Sulphur.



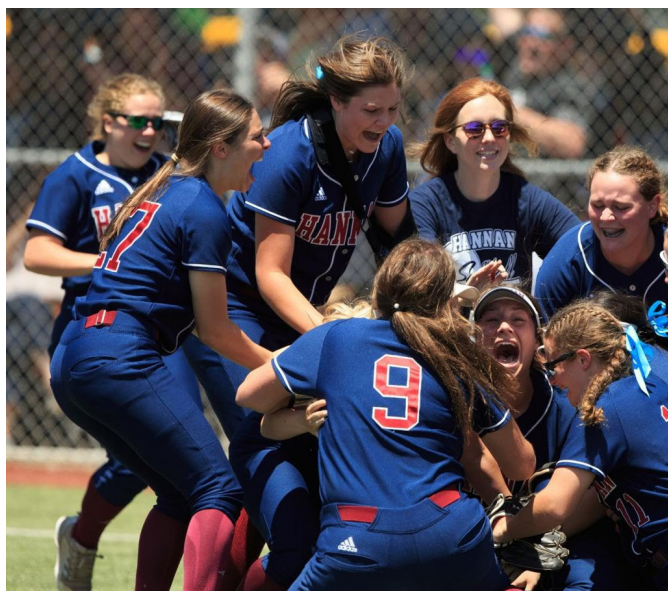
In the semi-finals, Hannan faced 3rd seeded St. Thomas More, 2018 State Runner-up. Again, the Lady Hawks answered early scores by STM. Bankston and Dale each tallied 2 hits, and Spinks again drove in 2 runs, while Clesi struck out 11 over seven innings in the 6-3 win. This victory set up the championship game with top-seeded Parkview Baptist the following day.

In the championship game, pitchers dominated early, as neither team scored through the first four innings. Shelby Thompson led off the 5th inning with a single to left. After a wild pitch, Hannah Kennedy was entered as a pinch runner at second. Parkview Baptist chose to intentionally walk Alexis Dale to get to Spinks. On the second pitch of her at-bat, Spinks launched a double deep into the left-center field gap, scoring Kennedy.

The score remained 1-0 entering the bottom of the 6th, where Parkview scored two runs. Alex Clesi limited the damage, getting a strikeout and ground out to end the 6th with the Hawks only down 2-1. The top of the seventh started with two strikeouts, and Parkview Baptist preparing for their 3rd straight State Championship celebration.

Alexis Dale worked a full count, then fouled off two pitches. On the eighth pitch of the at-bat, Dale lined a single into left field to keep the game alive. This hit was followed by Spinks getting hit by pitch, then walks to Amelia Mares (her third of the game) and Sydney Thompson to tie the score. Senior Sarah Dufour, in her final at-bat in a Hannan uniform, delivered the winning blow, driving a single to left field to score Mares and Thompson. The scoring concluded with a 2-run error off the bat of Kristen Wegener. When the dust settled and dog pile on the infield was over, the Lady Hawks were crowned State Champions for the 3rd time with a improbably 6-2 victory. Clesi finished the game with 8 strikeouts, while Dufour was named the Most Outstanding Player for the game.

On offense, the Lady Hawks were led by Alexis Dale (.563 BA, 48 Runs, 13 SB), Gentry Spinks (.477, 7 3B, 6 HR, 47 RBI, 48 R), Sarah Dufour (.390, 4 HR, 43 RBI), and Amelia Mares (.396, 2 HR, 30 RBI). On the mound, Alex Clesi had a 15-4 record with an impressive 185 strikeouts in 130 innings pitched, while Mares backed her up with an 11-2 record and 73 strikeouts in 68 innings.
